It would be useful for us to know the proportion of people in the UK who are lesbian, gay or bisexual, broken down by age and location. We provide services for LGB people across the country. Our Helpline provides a service for LGB people aged 13-24. Knowing how many young LGB people there are in the country would allow us to determine the reach of this service, and knowing where they are would help us to know where we should focus advertising for this service.

Census 2031 should also disaggregate data, making it clear how many people are gay men, how many are lesbian women, how many are bisexual men and how many are bisexual women. This information will allow us to analyse our own data in the context of full data on the specific numbers of lesbians, gay men and bisexuals in the country. We can then determine the percentages of lesbians, gay men and bisexuals using our services and engaging with us.

It is vital that data on sexual orientation is coupled with clear data on sex. Lesbians are female, gay men are male, and any census responses from males who identify as lesbians, or females who identify as gay men, must be separated out from other data on sexual orientation so as to ensure accurate data. A male attracted to women is heterosexual, so data that includes any such men in the category of lesbian is inaccurate and skews the results.

What purpose does your organisation use sexual orientation census data for?:

We use data on sexual orientation to conduct research on issues affecting lesbians, gay men and bisexuals. Our Business Forum conducted a piece of research and produced a report entitled 'Compelled Conformity' which investigated LGB people's experiences of workplace Equality, Diversity and Inclusion (EDI) practices. Data on the professions of LGB people allows us to contextualize this work - we can determine how many LGB people work in professions that are impacted by corrupted EDI.

We also have social groups across the country and are looking to set up more. For these purposes, it is important to know where LGB people are so we can ensure there is a Friends' Group wherever it is needed. Our services are expanding, so data about LGB people around the country is invaluable.

We can use sexual orientation data at small geographies to determine where each of our services is reaching and where they can have and are having the most impact. Our Friends' Groups tend to cover large geographical areas (Devon and Cornwall, East Sussex, Edinburgh and Glasgow etc.) and more data about the numbers of LGB people in each area would tell us how much reach our groups are having and where we should target to advertise our Friends' Groups and to set up new groups.

The census is the most wide-reaching survey which can determine the numbers of LGB people in the UK. Without including questions on sexual orientation in Census 2031, it is difficult to see how else this data could be collected. A separate survey to determine the numbers and details of LGB people across the whole country is unlikely to be carried out due to cost and logistics.

Without this data, LGB Alliance, the only charity in the UK exclusively working to serve the interests of same-sex attracted people, would not have access to comprehensive data on the constituent group we exist to serve. This would make it more difficult to analyse the impact of our services and to determine our reach. Knowing that we have reached x number of lesbians with a campaign or a service does not tell us much unless we know how many lesbians there are in the country. The research we conduct is more impactful and accurate if we know the percentage of LGB people we are talking about, and we can't know this if we don't know how many LGB people there are in total.

It is vital to stress that data on sex and data on sexual orientation must be analysed together to ensure the answers given are accurate. A person who answers that their sex is male and marks their sexual orientation as lesbian has provided inaccurate information which skews the data. A male exclusively attracted to females is heterosexual.

While we do not believe in the concept of gender identity, if it is to be included in Census 2031, it is important to look at this alongside sex and sexual orientation since someone who marks down a gender identity different to their sex may put down an inaccurate sexual orientation. Sexual orientation is rooted in sex, not gender identity, but the presence of gender identity as a topic group may confuse some people into thinking sexual orientation is determined by gender identity. This could cause them to mark down a same-sex sexual orientation when they are in fact heterosexual. It is vital to examine these answers carefully to ensure accurate data on sex and sexual orientation.
